During this time, we were lucky enough to be able to finally do a "Grand Tour" of the European continent together. We flew into Amsterdam, rented a car, and visited 8 countries in just under two weeks: Holland, Belgium,

France, Luxembourg, Germany, Austria, Slovakia, and the


Czech Republic!

Highlights in Holland included visiting the Anne Frank House, having an authentic Dutch pancake breakfast, and doing a cocktail cruise on the gorgeous canals of Amsterdam. Highlights in France included visiting the Vimy Ridge Canadian Memorial, going to a dinner show at the Moulin Rouge, having Parisian fountain style absinthe cocktails and French oysters at a Montmartre



café, and doing a cellar tour and tasting at the Moët & Chandon champagne house in Épernay. We had the best continental breakfast I have ever seen in my life in Luxembourg – way more than cereal, toast, and yogurt!!! Moira has been ma wee pal since she was a toddler! We share a love of books, unicorns, Irish dance, etc.



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


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# CELTIC KIDS CORNER



Sliotar (slit-er) a hard solid ball, slightly larger than a tennis ball, consisting of a cork core and covered by two pieces of leather stitched together. The sliotar is used in the national sport of Ireland, hurling (for men) and camogie (for women)!:
