Volunteers raise money and agree to have their head shaved at an annual event in support of raising funds for childhood cancer research. This year's event will be held on Saturday, March 25th at the Westin in Town Center, Virginia Beach. This year will be Scott MacGregor's 10th year as a shavee and ambassador of this wonderful organization. He volunteers in honor of José Andres Hernandez, who we lost at age 14 in September 2009 after a long and courageous battle with cancer. You

may donate (to go towards the IAS matching) at the March IAS meeting.

If you have not already paid your 2017 annual membership fees, they are now PAST DUE! Membership forms (for new and renewing members) are available at meetings, on the IAS website, and on the IAS Facebook page. Let's meet....

RAYMOND PATRICK MARION, better known as "Ray". In 1993 Ray saw an article in THE BEACON about The Irish American Society. There was a phone number to call for more information, so he did! He spoke to Tom Porter (former President) and decided to attend the meetings. He enjoyed everything about the I.A.S., eventually becoming the treasurer for 4 years and did a wonderful job! Ray was born in Scranton, Pa. on none other than ST.

PATRICK'S DAY, 1927. No wonder he has such a terrific IRISH name!! Both maternal and paternal great grandparents came from Ireland during the Irish famine in the 1840's and settled in Penna. Ray grew up in Archbald, Pa. with his brother and 2 sisters. His Dad was a coal miner and unfortunately died of black lung disease at age 51. His mother was a school teacher before she married and after Ray's Dad passed away, she went back to teaching in Catholic schools. Ray grew up during the Depression and remembers the hard times. When he was a teenager he was a cashier in Big Chief Supermarket in Pa. He remembers the customers using ration books during World War II.

Ray married Ann in 1950 and they had 8 children, 16 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild. Ray worked for 20 years at Eureka Printing Co. where he printed "S & H" green stamps, plus trading stamps of various kinds. When the company closed, he moved his family to North Philadelphia, where he worked for Zabel Brothers Printing

Co., printing baseball cards. In 1992 the Marion's moved to Va. Beach where their daughter and 2 sons lived. They liked it very much and decided to stay. Ray says "the weather is much nicer here than up North!" Ray and Ann were married 50 years. Shortly after their anniversary, Ann sadly passed away.

In November, 2003, Ray married Pat. Pat has 4 children and 6 grandsons. Together they have a VERY large family! Fantastic!! Ray and Pat took a cruise in 2006 and sailed over to Ireland, spending one day in Dublin and one day in Water- ford. They also enjoyed seeing the beautiful country side. While in Ireland, they saw a replica of the ship that the Kennedy family sailed on when they came to America.

Ray is now enjoying his retirement. He loves to cook and told me making desserts are his favorite dishes to make. O.K. Ray, next meeting we are looking forward to one of your delicious goodies!! He also likes to swim in his in ground pool....wonder if he ever skinny dips?.....Ray used to play golf, but since back problems, he had to give this up. He does enjoy watching sports on T.V., especially the Phila. Phillies baseball games and Phila. Eagles football games. Ray and Pat are active members of Catholic Church of the Ascension. They both attend the Irish American Society meetings, Irish breakfasts at Murphy's, Finnegan's Wake and our picnics. They are truly a wonderful asset to our Society. Michele invented the following cocktail when she was a bartender at the **Claddagh Ring Pub** in Chicago. Debra says it is quite potent, hence the name!

IRISH FUNERAL

1 part Vodka

1 part Kahlua


1 part Amaretto

1 part Jameson

2 parts Bailey's

Blend well in blender; serve chilled. Best if you store it in refrigerator overnight before serving. You can make it and shake it over ice to serve immediately, but that waters it down a bit, plus you have to have a really big shaker. Serve in chilled shot glasses or on the rocks in an Irish whiskey glass.

GUINNESS ICE CREAM FLOAT

3 cups Vanilla (or chocolate) Ice cCream 1 can of Guinness 1 (or more!!!) shot of Jameson Chocolate syrup Caramel Whipped cream

In blender, blend the first three ingredients. Drizzle chocolate syrup down sides of pint glass. Pour in the shake. Top with whipped cream and caramel.

St. Baldrick's Day 2017

Why donate to the annual St. Baldrick's fundraiser in support of childhood cancer research? Because all of our children deserve to enjoy their childhood and not have to cope with battling any form of cancer. Whether it is our child battling cancer or someone else's child; our combined efforts can make a difference in a child's life. St. Baldrick's is a young organization having been founded in 1999. In its short existence it has raised significant funds towards supporting research into many different approaches to finding cures. Since 2005 over \$200 million in grant funding of research projects has been awarded by St. Baldrick's. From these research projects many milestones have been accomplished. One such milestone as highlighted on their website is in "2015 when the FDA approved a new drug that drastically increases the cure rate for high-risk neuroblastoma patients. It's only the third approved drug in twenty years made specifically for kids with cancer."

Through our local event, held each March since at least 2007, I have supported or participated as a shavee as part of the Yes Way! Jose team. This will be my tenth year as a shavee, offering my hair in exchange for donations to this worthy cause. For all my years of support, St. Baldrick's has bestowed upon me the recognition of "Knight Commander". Through your gracious support over the years we have raised nearly \$11,000.

In recent years, since 2013, it has become a family event with my two daughters and four grandchildren joining me. One or more of my grandsons have participated each year since 2013. They are all recognized as a "Squire of Hope" by St. Baldrick's, meaning they have participated in at least three yearly events. In 2015 my daughters and granddaughter in addition to raising funds they each gave enough hair to make wigs for cancer patients. My oldest two grandsons have been working for the past two years to not only have their heads shaved this year but

to also donate their hair for wigs. The grandkids alone have raised several thousand dollars towards this worthy cause.

Our children have a whole lifetime ahead of them, let's keep up the hard work to make it a happy one. I hope you can find it in your hearts to give what you can towards supporting the efforts involved in finding a cure for childhood cancer. All donations are tax deductible according to the extent allowed by the law.

support your favorite players and join them for a beevy after the games at one of CoVA's fanstastic sponsors (more details forthcoming!).


