Pace yourselves, because this September is going to be one heck of a busy month chock full of fun! Here's the short list of everything going on, and then I will go into more detail on each.



SAT. SEPT. 15 – IAS HALFWAY TO PADDY DAY PUB CRAWL

We have rented a commercial bus that will seat 50 lucky leprechauns ready to get their pints on! Our official IAS Bagpiper, **Tom Crouch**, will pipe us off and on the bus at every pub crawl stop. We will

also have coolers on the bus, Celtic tunes, and other pub crawl swag to be announced later.

Tickets are \$20 per person, and you must be over



21 to attend. People do NOT have to be IAS members to attend, so feel free to invite family, friends, co-workers, neighbors, etc. ALL TICKETS ARE NONREFUNDABLE AND MUST BE BOUGHT IN ADVANCE.

You can buy your tickets immediately via PayPal at IAS.Tidewater@gmail.com . Make sure you list the first and last names of who the tickets are for in the comment for our pub crawl spreadsheet. You can also buy them with cash, check, or credit card at the September IAS meeting. I would get yours ASAP, though, so that they don't sell out on you.

The ticket guarantees your spot on the bus, but you are also responsible for buying all your food and drink at our various stops. If you buy a ticket and end up not being able to come, you may give or sell your ticket to someone else, but you MUST notify us in advance so we can update our spreadsheet with the correct name.

The pub crawl will start and end at **Murphy's**. The night of the pub crawl, meet at Murphy's at 5 pm. You must show photo ID when you check in with us to claim your special commemorative pub crawl wristband! You must be wearing that wristband at every stop to board the bus. You also must be wearing that wristband to avail yourself of special pub crawl food & drink specials at our various stops.

We plan to leave Murphy's by 6pm and return by 11:45 pm to finish out the night there. In between, we will be visiting various Irish drinking establishments in Norfolk (O'Connors Brewing Co., The Public House) and VB (Finn McCool's). We will have a private room for food & drinks at our middle stop, but we recommend you get some



I heard this second hand, as I was kept in the other room with the girls. Being an American woman, I did not like being kept out of the festivities in the other room! Mammy sent us girls to bed earlier than the lads. The girls were to start getting ready for the 2 p.m. wedding at 8 a.m. the next morning. Yes, 8 a.m. for a 2 p.m. wedding that would last until 4 a.m. the next day. Can you say 5-hour energy shots? That 8 a.m. start included a full Irish Breakfast for EVERYONE, which would be the devil if you had a bit too much to drink the night before.

No wonder it takes so long to get ready for an Irish wedding; it was like a scene from the Oscars! Irish weddings are a fashion cat walk. Who knew you were supposed to have multiple outfits for the reception, too! Did you? I didn't -- such a classic American first timers mistake.

While sitting in the Church parking lot, what do we see, but tractors decorated with ribbon, signs, and flowers making their way up to the Church! What else would a groom/farmer use to get to and from a wedding?

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BARTENDER'S CHOICE

This month's cocktail is a seasonal one. But first, let me ask you a question. What do you do with bananas when they are overripe? Everyone knows the answer to that – make banana bread with them! Well, what do you do if you have a stone fruit (peach, plum, or nectarine) that has just become overripe? The answer is you make the following drink, which is delicious!!! It takes the classic G&T to an unbelievably scrumptious new level – you can't even believe how much yummier until you try it!

BILL REID'S JUST PEACHY G&T

1 overripe (but not rotten) peach, nectarine, or plum per person

1 generous jigger of your favorite quality gin per drink 8 or so ounces of your favorite tonic/diet tonic water per drink

1 packet Truvia or Stevia per drink (optional) Ice

A highball glass for each person

Remove the stem and any store labels from an overripe stone fruit. Wash the fruit, but leave the skin on. With a sharp fruit knife, cut all the way around the cleavage of the fruit so that it is cut in half; don't separate the halves. This will be a bit juicy and messy; let the juice drip into the highball. Now cut all the way around the fruit so that the halves are halved. Carefully pry each quarter



of the fruit from the pit (or stone) inside, and put all four quarters into the highball. Top with several ice cubes. If you want to add a little natural sugar substitute like Stevia, now is the time to open the packet and dump the contents in the glass. If your fruit is overripe and juicy, this isn't really necessary, though. Add a jigger of good

gin, and then fill the rest of the glass with tonic water. Stir with a teaspoon, swizzle stick, or straw, mashing the fruit a little if you can. ENJOY!!! If you want another Just Peachy G&T after you finish this one, you can get several drinks out one piece of fruit – just leave it in the bottom of the glass and re-use it. There is PLENTY of juice and flavor still left in it.

The atached picture was taken by my buddy Bill Reid in Scotland. I got this cocktail idea from him. He and his lovely wife Karen are the founders of East of the Hebrides Entertainments (http://www.eastofthehebrides.com/). They used to put on the Philly Midwinter Celtic Music Festival that so many of us enjoyed over the years. Now they do a variety of guided Scottish tours. Bill is quite the gin connoisseur, and the following paragraph is excerpted from his advice to me about good gin brands and great gin garnish pairings.

"... What makes the Scottish (as well as the many new Irish and English gins) is the infusions of locally grown botanicals. The taste and complexion is entirely different than the gins we grew up with and sadly are limited to in most US bars. Most people who hate gin is due to the heavy juniper most London-style gins are made with. And American bars seem to always use lime as the garnish. You can get wonderful tastes from so many gins and fruits. Look for Caorunn in your store. I love this one. Add a couple slices of green apple. Hills and Harbour from the Galloway area of Scotland calls for mango. Rock Rose -Mandarin orange. **Blackwood** - either slices of strawberry or raspberries with a little black peppercorn. Harris - ruby red grapefruit. The Whitley Neill is a small batch English gin with African botanicals. I decided to try peaches and WOW! I did this at home with inexpensive (but nice) Burnetts and it worked. There is an Irish gin - Gunpowder Gin - infused with

tea... I like the Hendrick but not a huge fan of cucumber. Look for The Botanist from Islay. It's gorgeous! Try a sprig of rosemary. Or slices of plum. Now the tonic is important. Fever Tree is the one! Get it at Whole Foods, Weis Markets. Try the original (gold label) and their Mediterranean. And they make a low calorie, too."

This August, local Virginia piper GEOFFREY SAUR had the honor and pleasure of participating in the EDINBURGH TATTOO in Scotland's capital city! During the month-long tattoo, Geoffrey and the other pipers of "The Pipers Trail" played 25 shows on the Esplanade of Edinburgh Castle in front of an audience of 220,000! They had to learn all the music ahead of time, and then learn the marching patterns once they got to Edinburgh. Our local Celtic community should be so proud that one of our own did this!

Now, on the basis of their great performance in Edinburgh, Geoffrey has been given another once-in-alifetime chance: to pipe in both the LIVERPOOL TATTOO in England

and the **DUSSELDORF TATTOO** in Germany this fall! During the tattoos, his room, board, and transportation will be covered.

HOWEVER, the problem standing in his way is that he needs funding to support himself overseas during the next month BEFORE the next tattoo begins. Just enough for a room, some food each day -- basically, enough to put together with some busking on clear days to get by for a month.
