## SEARCHING MY IRISH ROOTS


One of the appeals of a DNA test is a large pool of people who have taken the test. There's at least a chance one will find matches and possibly be able to make contact and explore family connections.

My top match turned out to be a 1st cousin. Now that's really something to be matched to a 1st cousin that you've never heard of before! What an experience it has been for both of us to explore how and why we didn't know about each other until now.

It turns out she was adopted as a baby. Due to a change in her home state's law, she was able to obtain her birth certificate details showing bio mother and father. Both have passed away, but a child of that marriage is still alive. On contacting the child, she learned that the marriage of the bio mom and dad had dissolved, and that her mom was in a relationship with one of my uncles. Bingo, the DNA connection with me is explained.

My DNA test has also led to other matches. For one, it connected me to a 1st Cousin, once removed, on my maternal side. My mom's family tree had previously been such a mystery.

Another appeal of the DNA test shows where your ancestors probably lived. Percentages are used to show the degree to which your DNA matches up to people who lived in various regions. For example, at 45% it appears I have a strong match with people who lived in County Donegal. That reinforces the accuracy of my family tree as both of my paternal great, great-grandparents are from Donegal.



These percentages are estimates so I can't really say I'm 45% Irish. Actually, the range of probability for me is 29% - 55%. So it appears I'm half-Irish, plus or minus. It's not exact as each of us inherit DNA from both parents, and they in turn from their parents, and so on. And, most important, we only get a random sampling of their DNA. Not all of it. Siblings, for example, usually each get a different sampling so that one may acquire a larger or smaller amount of the Irish DNA of their ancestors. So, yes, it might appear that one sibling is more or less Irish than the other.

It would be interesting to make comparisons with others. For example, my newly found 1st cousin is 95% linked to the same area of Co. Donegal. The implications of that are fascinating to me, that almost all of her ancestors lived in Ireland. And I recently learned that our own Catherine Twomey is 97% linked to Ireland. She says her parents were from the midlands of Ireland (Tullamore, Co. Offaly) and likely most folks in that area didn't stray far from home. Her maiden name (Levings) is not well known outside that area but Catherine says it's very common on the headstones where her parents are buried (Birr, Co. Offaly).

Deepest sympathies to Heather Hanchett Burns and the rest of her family on the loss in late August of her beloved father, Frank Hanchett. Heather is a founding member of our IAS Paddy Pack, an officer in the Irish Wolfhound Association of the Mid **South**, and the awesome presenter of a February 2011 program for the IAS on "Irish Brooches of the Celtic Revival". Heather comes by her love of nature and animals from her father, a lifelong conservationist. Frank was also a US Army veteran of the Korean War, and an educator who served as a teacher, guidance counselor, and administrator during his career. Most important in his life, though, were his Irish bride Joan, his four children, his grandchildren, and his great-grandchildren (some of whom he is reading to in the attached picture). Frank passed

after a massive stroke, surrounded by loved ones. Heather's husband, the Rev. Mark Burns, presided over his memorial service at the same New Hampshire church where Heather's mother was eulogized 11 years ago. 




## US GATA NORTH AMERICAN 2018 FINALS


